MK MIX IN CONVERSATION WITH JADE ADE



FILM director and screenwriter Segun Oguntola arrived in Milton Keynes in 2007 after growing up in south-east London and spending five years developing a film industry in the Gambia, west Africa. He was immediately struck by how so many cultures and backgrounds were represented in the city's new population and set out how to find out why so many people come here to make a new start, and become part of the

1. Who are you and what is your background?

l am a British born Nigerian and have lived in the UK for the last 20 years. I lived in London for most of that only moving to Milton Keynes two years ago. I qualified with an HND in Hotel and Catering, hold a teacher training certificate, and studied business and finance at North London University.

Over the years I have worked with a number of public sector funded organisations to support young people by helping them identify their potential.

I have sponsored healthy eating campaigns in London for teenagers where they were recruited and trained to cook wholesome food with fresh ingredients bought from the market. I am passionate about developing and engaging young people from diverse backgrounds, especially those that are socially excluded.

2. What attracted to you come to MK in the first place?

I was attracted to Milton Keynes by my sister and brother-in-law who have lived here for eight years. They emphasised the youthfulness of the city and the peaceful surroundings. When I visited their church I fell in love with the word of God. I love the quiet life and greenery and the space; it's a good environment to raise children. Coming from London Lambeth where crime is very high, it was important for me to bring my son up in an environment where we can have a good friend and family support.

3. What's the most striking difference you've found between MK and the place where you've lived the longest?

London is a highly cosmopolitan city with lots of people from different origins. It is bubbly, full of life and colourful. It has a very good public transport system including buses and the trains. However, in recent years it has become plagued with crime especially among the youth. Milton Keynes is a unique city completely different from any other city in the UK. It is a growing city with lots of different culture, a beautiful

potpourri mix of people with young families.

4. Please tell us about all the ways in which you are involved in MK life?

My project in Milton Keynes has been to promote community cohesion and encourage Afro Caribbeans and the ethnic minority groups to identify, look after, and celebrate their cultural heritage. Some of the events we have done include 2009 Black History Month. This was a cultural fun day with food from the different countries including African-inspired fashions, energetic African dancing and a number of stalls showcasing different speciality products. I also organised a spring/summer fun day for young people, and a networking event in June 2010 to empower black and ethnic minority businesses.

5. How easy have you found it to settle here?

I have found it relatively easy to settle as I have family here and have made good friends within the church. It has taken some getting used to, especially the quietness and I miss some of the hustle and bustle of London. My major bugbear has been the public transportation provision for a city of this kind, I think these needs to be developed and expanded.

JADE Ade has several years' experience in cultural and event management, catering and hospitality. She is involved in Youth Development as well as providing support for ethnic minority small and medium businesses. She owns a non profit social enterprise called 'Melting Pot' and moved to Milton Keynes two years ago attracted by the 'potpourri' mix of people.

6. How far have you spread your net so far?

I have made links with small and medium businesses, the Business Link and Chambers of Commerce and some existing social enterprises. I worked with the local group – Awake for Africa to celebrate the Black History Month in October 2009. I recently attended the first Miss Tropical MK which was a great event to see within the community.

7. Are you planning to stay in MK for a fixed time for good?

Yes. I plan to stay in Milton Keynes with my family. My vision is to encourage more people who have the desire and talents to become self employed and start businesses particularly young people, women, men, black and ethnic communities, and those living in the most deprived areas of the city thereby adding value to their lives.

8. Before considering moving here to make a new life, what's the best piece of advice you could offer people?

I would say come down with your family and have a check list of what your family needs are. You will probably have a long list of ticks.

9. Tell us something about the city/country of your origins?

Nigeria used to be known as the giant of Africa. It is extremely rich in petrol and lots of other natural gas. Nigeria is a beautiful country rich in many ways with lots of natural resources. Traditional dishes include jolloff rice with fried meat served with dodo (fried plantain).

10. What would you say to people who can't find anything good to say about the city?

Milton Keynes is an evolving city. I will say every city or town has different challenges however, my philosophy is that wherever you are try to help make a difference.
